Introduction

It is good to spend some time looking at the Bible each day, so that you grow in your faith.

But it is not always easy to do this on your own.

Some people can read but don't like to 😧

Some people find it hard to finish long books with big words.

Some people find it hard to focus on long sentences.

If any of those feel familiar,

then these notes have been written for you!

Why read this book?

Reading the true story about Jesus can help you to grow as a Christian. A Christian is someone who has put their trust in Jesus as God's Son.

We all put things other than God in first place in our lives.

The Bible says that there is a punishment for that.

But Jesus came to this world to die in our place,

so that we can be friends with God—

because that's what God really wants!

A good habit

As we read the Bible, we see what God is really like and how much He loves us.

So, it's really good to read the Bible every day.

It helps to find a time that suits you, and then stick with it!

Some people like to do this first thing in the morning.

Other people choose to do it in the evening or at bedtime.

Whatever works for you is fine. If you miss a day, don't worry!

All about the Gospels

Gospel means "good news".

In the Bible, the Gospels are true stories of Jesus' life (biographies).

There are 4 Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Each Gospel is written for different kinds of readers, and so they focus on slightly different things.

- Matthew wrote to people with a Jewish background.
 He often included quotes from the Old Testament to show how Jesus fulfilled God's promises.
- Mark wrote a short Gospel
 to get down the facts about Jesus.
 It may be the first Gospel that was written down.
 Jesus' friends thought that He might return soon.
 When they saw it wasn't going to be that quick,
 Mark wrote down Jesus' true story for others to read.

- Luke was a Gentile (a non-Jew) and a doctor.
 He wrote so that other Gentiles could be sure
 of the facts about Jesus
 and know that He was the Saviour for all people.
- John wrote much later (we think) and he wanted people to understand Jesus and His teaching more deeply.
 John's Gospel includes lots more teaching than the others.
 It has layers—a bit like an onion!

We're going to look at 7 or 8 passages from each Gospel. We will get a bigger picture of who Jesus is by seeing His life from different angles.

We'll start with Mark, because it's short and fast-paced and written in everyday words.

It starts when Jesus is 30 years old.

Day 1 Jesus, Son of God

Mark 1 verses 1 and 9-11

- This is the beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God. ...
- 9 At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee.
 John baptised Jesus in the Jordan river.
- Jesus was coming up out of the water.
 Just then he saw heaven being torn open.
 Jesus saw the Holy Spirit coming down on him like a dove.
- 11 A voice spoke to him from heaven.
 It said, "You are my Son, and I love you.
 I am very pleased with you."

More info

God is only one God. He has been God for ever.

He has also always existed as three "Persons":

God the Father, God the Son (Jesus),

and God the Holy Spirit.

God is the God of loving relationship!

Messiah means God's promised King and Saviour.

Some things to notice

Mark wants us to know who Jesus is.

He wants us to know that it's GOOD news that Jesus came.

Jesus is the Son of God the Father. Jesus is God!

The Holy Spirit gave Jesus power for the work He came to do.

As Jesus began his ministry,

God the Father spoke to Him out loud,

to confirm His love for Him

Some questions to think about

- Why is the Father pleased with Jesus?
- Do I think it helped Jesus to see the Holy Spirit and to hear His Father's voice? Why?
- If I am a Christian, God loves and accepts me, and I have His Spirit to help me.
 What does this mean to me today?

Some words to pray

Loving Father, thank You that You love me and want to bless me.

Thank You that Jesus is Good News.

Thank You that Jesus came so I could know Your love.

Please help me to be confident today

that You have good plans for me

and that You have good work for me to do for You,

because You love me.

I need help to live for You,

so please fill me with Your Holy Spirit.

I ask these things in Jesus' name,

for my good and for Your glory. Amen.
