# HOW CAN I BE SURE WHAT'S RIGHT AND WRONG?

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## **DISCUSSION GUIDE**

#### CHAPTER 1

Look at the basic moral rules listed on page 9 (starting with "Be kind rather than cruel"). Would most people you know agree with them? What different ones might they add?

If you had a friend in the situation described on page 10, what would be the kindest thing to do for them, do you think? Might others disagree with you?

Why might some people say that the Bible is not relevant, or even harmful, when it comes to deciding what's right and wrong?

#### **CHAPTER 2**

- Why is it impossible to surround yourself with people who agree with you on what's right and wrong?
  - How do you feel about pineapple on a pizza?! Is that a question of right and wrong, or just an opinion? What's the difference?
  - How does the example of "exposure" from Ancient Rome illustrate the problem with everyone deciding what's right and wrong for themselves?

#### CHAPTER 3

- Can you think of other ideas from the past which seemed to be "common sense" at the time but now seem wrong to us?
  - Are there things in our society today that future generations might look at and describe as wrong?
  - How would you answer Chris' question on page 28: "If the whole world voted to declare slavery good, would that actually make it good?" What are some of the implications of your answer?

#### **CHAPTER 4**

▼ If you were someone who didn't believe in God, and thought that humans got here by accident, how might you explain how we know what's right and wrong?

Do you think those explanations stack up? What problems might there be with them?

How does discovering our true purpose (what we were created for) help us to work out what's truly right and wrong?

#### **CHAPTER 5**

- ▼ How does Jesus sum up what our purpose in life is in Matthew 22:36-40 (p 40)?
- Chris describes in detail his love of burgers! Do you have something that you really love like that? How is that different from what Jesus meant by "love"?
- What did Jesus show us about what love really looks like, by his actions at his last dinner with his friends?
  - How do equal human rights and universal kindness follow naturally from what Jesus taught?

#### **CHAPTER 6**

- How would you respond to this question on page 51: "Even when the right thing to do seems completely clear to us, why do we still have so much trouble actually doing it?" Can you think of a situation where you've experienced that to be the case?
- How did God's first people attempt to reinvent good and evil for themselves (p 52-53)?
- If Jesus came merely to show us how to live a good life, why would that actually be quite depressing?

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What's the good news about Jesus that we discover in the Bible instead?

#### **CHAPTER 7**

- How often do you find yourself in a situation in which right and wrong is not black and white? Can you share about a time when it wasn't clear what you should do?
- V How is wisdom described on pages 60-61?
- What does the phrase "Wisdom is a pathway, not a door" mean?
- What's the grid on page 65 that helps us make decisions? What would it have looked like to apply those questions to the situation you described in question 1?

#### **CHAPTER 8**

- ✔ If you follow Jesus, have you ever been tempted to judge your friends who don't and to criticise their behaviour? What ought we do instead, according to page 71?
- We have the cross show us that evil will never win in the end?
- Do you agree with this statement on page 74: "As a follower of Jesus, my main job isn't to show the world how right I am. It's to love the person in front of me." What might that look like specifically for you this week?

#### CHAPTER 9

- Have you witnessed disagreements between Christians, whether in your own family, church or even on the internet? Why does this happen?
- Why is the Bible the best place to help us find out what God has to say to us? But why is that challenging sometimes?
- V What does it look like to show love to other Christians when we disagree with them?

#### **CHAPTER 10**

- When does Jesus start to change our hearts and when will that transformation be complete?
- What role do we play in that transformation (p 86)?
- Which idea from the whole book has been most helpful to you as you think about what's right and wrong?
