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Introduction

It is good to spend some time looking at the Bible each day, so that you grow in your faith.

But it is not always easy to do this on your own.

Some people can read but don't like to 😧

Some people find it hard to finish long books with big words.

Some people find it hard to focus on long sentences.

If any of those feel familiar,

then these notes have been written for you!

A good habit

As we read the Bible, we see what God is really like and how much He loves us.

So, it's really good to read the Bible every day.

It helps to find a time that suits you, and then stick with it! Some people like to do this first thing in the morning.

Other people choose to do it in the evening or at bedtime.

Whatever works for you is fine. If you miss a day, don't worry!

All about Jonah

In this book we are going to read the true Bible story of Jonah. Here is what happens in the story. Jonah was a prophet who lived 2,800 years ago.

He came from Gath Hepher—you can see it on the map below.

God called Jonah to go to Nineveh,

a place where people were doing many evil things.

God told Jonah to give the people in Nineveh a warning:


God was going to judge the people of Nineveh

and punish them for all the evil things they were doing.

But Jonah didn't want to warn them, so he ran away!

He got onto a ship and went on a long sea journey.

He thought he could hide from God.



After a big storm and a 3-day visit to the inside of a fish,
Jonah changed his mind and went to Nineveh.
He warned the people and they repented.
This means they changed their minds
about what they were doing, and stopped doing it.
God saw they were really sorry, so he did not punish them.
He forgave them.

How this book works

We will look at a few Bible verses each day.

We'll think about what Jonah's story tells us about him and what it tells us about God.

Then we will ask some questions to see how it can challenge or comfort us.

Day 1 Jonah's past

2 Kings 14 verses 25-27

- 25 Jeroboam, the son of Jehoash, made the borders of Israel the same as they were before.
 They reached from Lebo Hamath all the way to the Dead Sea.
 That's what the LORD, the God of Israel, had said would happen. He had spoken that message through his servant Jonah.
 Jonah the prophet was the son of Amittai.
 Jonah was from the town of Gath Hepher.
- The LORD had seenhow much everyone in Israel was suffering.It didn't matter whether they were slaves or free.They didn't have anyone to help them ...
- 27 So he saved them by the hand of Jeroboam.

Some things to notice

This is the first time Jonah is written about in the Bible.

He's called God's servant.

He spoke to the people when God told him to.

God saw that the people were suffering.

He sent Jonah to tell them that He had a plan to help them.

The plan was to do with Jeroboam, the king of Israel.

God cares deeply about His people.

Jonah's message from God came true.

More info

When LORD is written like this, in capitals, it always means God.

God is the LORD. That means He is powerful and in charge.

Lebo Hamath and the Dead Sea

were places at the edges of Israel.

Jonah was from the town of Gath Hepher.

That was in a region called Galilee.

Jesus came from there too!

Some questions to think about

- How do I think Jonah felt when God's word came true?
- What has God promised me that has already come true?
- Do I believe God cares deeply about me?
 What difference does it make?
