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Before You Begin

Welcome to *God's Story, Our Story*—a bite-sized, multimedia journey through the Bible for the whole family. You'll travel from Genesis to Revelation in 45 sessions and discover how the Bible forms one great story. Meet the characters, explore the events and discover how you can be part of God's ongoing story and plan for our world!

This family resource is simple to run and fun to use. No prior knowledge is needed. We've written it to work for anyone who can sit still and chat for a while. (We think age 5 plus.)

Here's how it works...

The whole journey is made up of nine Bible story sets, with five sessions in each set. (So if you do this Monday to Friday, it will take nine weeks.) Four of the sessions are based on Bible stories and the fifth session is a memory verse that sums up the set. Each session should take a maximum of 15 minutes, and is probably do-able in 10.

Apart from memory-verse days, each session follows the same pattern:

Hear it: Each session begins with an overview of the Bible story for the day. You can either read the script yourselves or listen to us telling the story—follow the QR code to discover that option. For the first four sessions, there's also a video option you can QR-code your way to. Each story follows the same pattern: a scene-setting question connects to *Our Story*. Then we hear about a key Bible story and think about where it fits in *God's Story*. Finally, we reflect on what it means for our lives today.

Read it: There's a short Bible reading; we encourage you to find it and follow the passage in a print copy of the Bible.

Discuss it: Talk through the questions. (It's probably best if an adult leads this bit to keep the pace up.) Some questions are serious, some are a bit silly and others are more applied.

Pray it: Take a moment to be still and read the prayer.

Do it: This final suggestion gives a punchy and practical application.

We would also recommend you have a **Place it** moment at the end, using the *God's Story, Our Story Cards* that are designed to accompany this book. They can be found at thegoodbook.com/gods-story-cards. Each Bible story session has an accompanying card, with illustrations and key facts. As you do each session, hang, stick or prop each card up to form a visual Bible storyline in your own home. This installation will reinforce how the whole Bible fits together. (More information and game ideas are available with the card set.)

What's more, if your whole church would like to do *God's Story, Our Story* together, you'll find all-age talks for Sundays and some other church resources at thegoodbook.com/gods-story-resources. There you'll also find all the audio and video, and larger printouts of the images on the cards. Use the code printed at the bottom of this page to get access.

A final word from us, now that you're ready to go...

Over the last 18 years, we have loved gathering our three kids together over breakfast to read God's story, the Bible. It's never been dull! It's always been challenging, surprising and life-changing. Our prayer is that as you explore *God's Story, Our Story* together, it will shape and inspire your family story too. By the end, we hope you will see how the whole Bible fits together and feel better equipped to live your family story today.

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Memory-Verse Days: Some Top Tips

It is a challenge to memorise God's words—and it is a gift. The Bible says that if we hide God's word in our hearts, we won't sin against him. His words also give us courage and comfort when things are tough.

For the fifth day in each set, as a family you can memorise a little part of the Bible. Each verse we've chosen summarises what you have looked at in your Bible stories that week. Each verse is printed in the book. If you have the *God's Story, Our Story Cards*, you'll find each verse on a card in that pack too—pop it into your Bible storyline once you have learned it.

There will be words to memorise and the location in the Bible where you can find them. For example, 1 Samuel chapter 16 verse 7 (Week 4's memory verse) will be written as 1 Samuel 16 v 7. It is from the story of David, when he is chosen to be king. It says, "People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart". (It's a great idea to go and find the verse in your Bible. You can find out where the book of the Bible is in the contents page.)

Here are some ideas of how you can memorise each verse. See what works the best for you. Don't be boring! You can have lots of fun trying to remember God's word.

Writing: Write the verse by hand on flash cards or post-it notes, or write the verse on a board. You could then do the "disappearing word game". Read it and then take away or rub out one word at a time, and then repeat, reciting it again and again after each word disappears. For example:

Visualising: Create “word pictures” or use emojis to make the verse memorable. Draw these onto paper, replacing key words. For instance:



Actions: Decide on simple actions together to go with a key word from the verse.

People (point at various people in the room) look (pretend to hold binoculars to your eyes) at the outward appearance (grab your own top or t shirt and shake it about a bit), but the LORD (point up to the sky) looks (binoculars again) at the heart (do a heart shape with your fingers or hold your hand over the position where your heart is).

1 (hold up one finger) Samuel 16 (hold up one finger, then six fingers), verse 7 (hold up seven fingers).

Song: Turn the verse into a song by making up your own melody or using a well-known tune to sing your Bible-verse words to.

Audio recording: Record yourself reciting the passage and listen to it during daily activities such as driving or walking or brushing your teeth.

Digital apps: Try out apps like Remember Me or Anki. It’s best to explore these beforehand to see how they work!

To really remember the verse well, simply repeat, repeat, repeat—in several different ways.



Week One

Beginnings



DAY 1

Creation: God Made It Good

GENESIS 1 – 2



Our Story

The world is an amazing place, isn't it? The skies twinkle with lights. There are mountains to explore and oceans to swim in. Everywhere you look there is vibrant vegetation. The world is full of flying, leaping, running and buzzing things. It is all so good. On the very best of days it almost feels perfect!

God's Story

Our very first story from the Bible is about the beginning of everything and it starts very simply, with God. God wasn't lonely. But he did want to share his love and be in a relationship with people. He wanted to create a home for us to enjoy—and then create us to enjoy it.

Creation Story

In the very beginning it was dark. Silent. Still.

Imagine that! No light, no noise, no action.

But God was excited. He had so many ideas about what he wanted to do.

He knew we needed days and nights, darkness and light, waters and sky, land and seas. So, he spoke them into being with simple words, "Light!" "Sky!" "Land!" And there were islands, waterfalls and lakes.

These first three days of shaping and forming were good, but the land lacked colour and life. So God filled the world with grasses and bushes, fruits and flowers, vegetables and seeds. And trees. Many, many trees. Palm trees and

pinus, apple trees and alders, beech trees and baobab. God also made two extra-special trees—a tree of life and a tree of knowledge of good and evil.

Day four: the sky could be more fun... So, God filled it with stars, moons, planets and a big blazing sun.

Day five: the world was too silent... So, God filled it with many vibrant things. At his word the waters teemed with creatures: narwhal, sea cucumbers, orca and clown fish. And as he spoke the sky was flooded with flying features: ladybirds, hummingbirds, bald eagles and parrots.

Day six: it was time to create the animals—the weird and the wonderful, the ugly and the beautiful: sheep, chickens, wolves, zebras, iguanas, wombats and orangutans.

God again looked over all that he had made and declared it good. Good, but not very good.... Not perfect. Not full. Not complete. The world still lacked something, the best thing...

People!!! So God made them too. He moulded them out of the earth. He breathed his life into them. They were different to everything else God had made, because they were made to be like him. They talked and walked with him. They thought like him. God planted a garden for them to work in. And he told them to enjoy and look after everything he had made for them.

And finally, day seven: God stopped. God rested from all his work. God "Sabbathed". For everything was now very good. Everything was perfect.

God's Story

God put the first people in a garden called Eden, which means paradise. It was a safe place, a home where they could enjoy life with God. The Bible story starts in this perfect place, and despite everything that went wrong and that still goes wrong today, God promises that our story will one day finally return there.

Our Story

It is difficult for us to imagine a perfect world and perfect people. What must it have been like to be so close to God? Like you are walking and talking with him face to face? God made us to enjoy this special relationship with him, and we are going to see that through Jesus this is still possible.

Read It: Genesis 1 v 26-28, 31

Then God said, "Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

*So God created mankind in his own image,
in the image of God he created them;
male and female he created them.*

*God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number;
fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in
the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground." ...*

*God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was
evening, and there was morning—the sixth day.*

Discuss It

- *What is your favourite thing that God created?*
- *What was God's favourite and best thing that he created?*
- *How does it make you feel to know that out of all the things God made, you are so special to God, and that he loves you and made this wonderful world for you?*
- *What do you think it means that God made us in his image to be like him?*

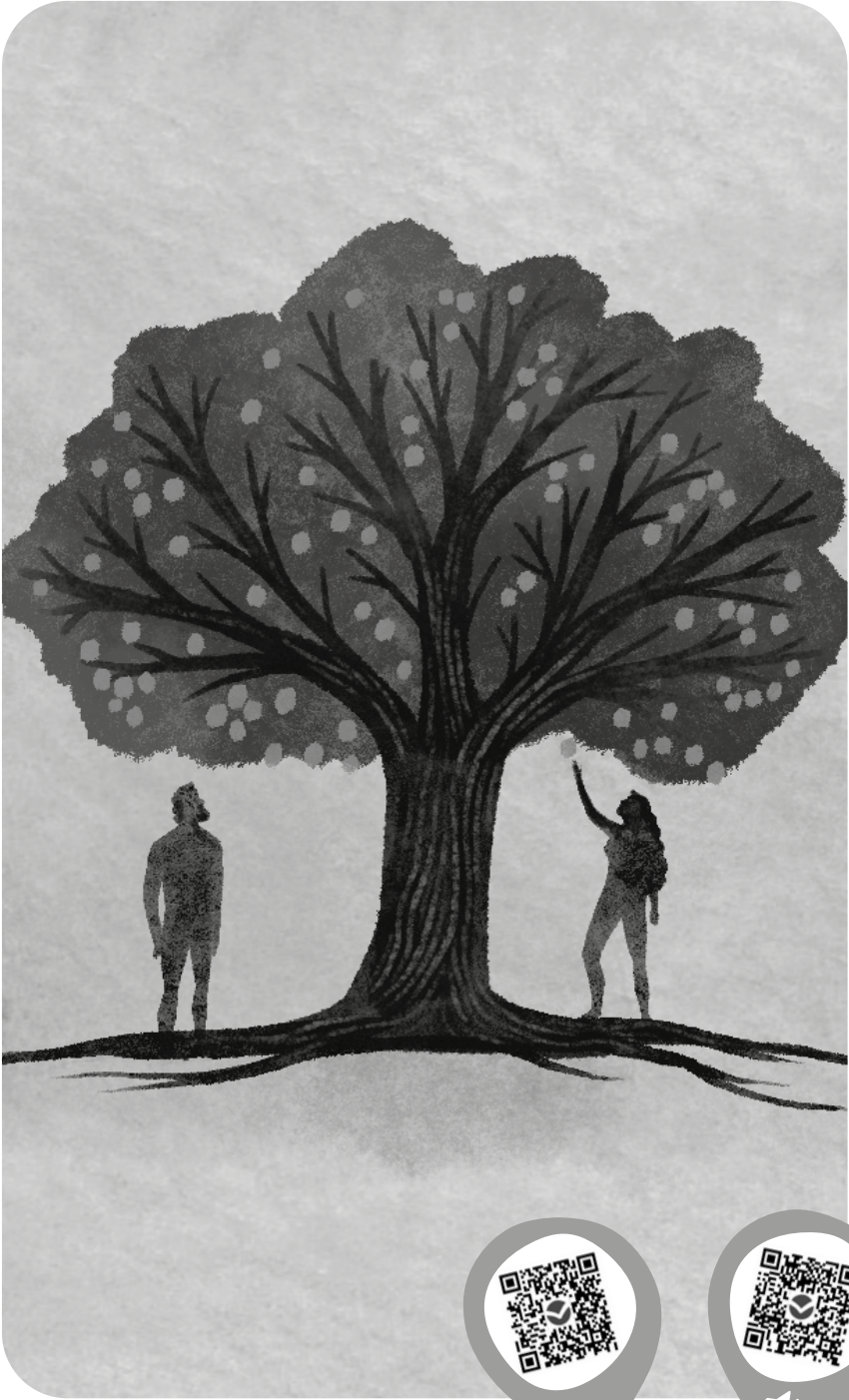
Pray It

DAY 2

The Fall: Things Turn Bad

GENESIS 3



Our Story

Why are blackberries surrounded by thorns and often filled with worms? Why do our pets and family members get sick and sometimes die? Why is it easier to lie than to tell the truth and easier to be selfish than to be kind? It's not right. It's like something has broken and gone terribly wrong.

God's Story

Today's story takes us back to the moment when evil and sin entered the world. As we saw last time, God had not created things this way. In fact, Adam and Eve lived in a perfect world and could enjoy it for ever. The Garden of Eden was so perfect that only one rule was necessary; there was just one tree that was out of bounds. And this tree, the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, came with a warning: "When you eat from it you will certainly die." Can you imagine that? Only one rule! Easy enough, right?

The Fall Story

In the middle of the beautiful garden God had made stood a fruit tree. However, it was no ordinary fruit tree. Adam and Eve could work around it, sit under it, enjoy its shape and colour but God had clearly said they were not allowed to eat its fruit. They could eat from apple trees, pear trees, pomegranate trees and mango trees. They could pick and enjoy jack fruit and pomellos and plums but they could not eat fruit from this one tree. Because if they did they would die, God said. You see, this tree was different. It was a tree that gave knowledge about good and evil. And God didn't want Adam and Eve to understand or experience evil...

One day a crafty snake strikes up a conversation with Eve. He plays with her mind. He sows doubts in her soul. Maybe the forbidden fruit is what she needs to be happy and successful? Maybe eating it will make her like God knowing and deciding what is good and what is evil? Eve listens. She decides not to trust God. She eats and passes the fruit to Adam—who also ignores God’s loving warning. They both disobey God—they both sin.

One rule is broken, two choices are made and things begin to go terribly wrong.

They feel embarrassed.

They feel afraid.

They run from God

They hide.

They lie.

They snitch.

They blame each other.

And death and evil enter the world.



Because Adam and Eve had eaten the fruit and disobeyed God, their relationship with each other was broken. They were disconnected from God. God still loved them but life would now be tough and painful, and life would now end. God said they must leave his presence and the garden.

God’s Story

Yet, as God turned Adam and Eve away from the garden he began a great rescue plan. He clothed them with animal skins. That’s right, an animal was sacrificed to cover for Adam and Eve. Hold that thought because this points to another sacrifice years later that would heal hurt, destroy death, mend relationships and bring people back to God.

God also gave the first people a promise. He promised that one day another person would come who would always choose right and crush that crafty snake once and for all. One day, there would be no more death, loneliness or fear.

Our Story

The sacrifice and the promise as Adam and Eve leave Eden of course both point to Jesus. He is the snake crusher that appears throughout the Bible story to put everything right again. He came so that you, and anyone who trusts in him, can look forward to being in a new, perfect creation with God, a place like Eden, where we will no longer experience death or loneliness or fear.

Read It: Genesis 3 v 1-6, 21, 23

Now the snake was more crafty than any of the wild animals the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God really say, 'You must not eat from any tree in the garden'?"

The woman said to the snake, "We may eat fruit from the trees in the garden, but God did say, 'You must not eat fruit from the tree that is in the middle of the garden, and you must not touch it, or you will die.'"

"You will not certainly die," the snake said to the woman. "For God knows that when you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil."

When the woman saw that the fruit of the tree was good for food and pleasing to the eye, and also desirable for gaining wisdom, she took some and ate it. She also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it ...

The LORD God made garments of skin for Adam and his wife and clothed them ... the LORD God banished him from the Garden of Eden to work the ground from which he had been taken.

Discuss It

- *Why is it good to have rules? What rules do you have to follow?*
- *What one rule did God give Adam and Eve, and why?*
- *What sad changes happened when Adam and Eve disobeyed God?*
- *Why is life so much better if we do what God tells us?*
- *How has this story made you more grateful for what Jesus came to do?*

Pray It

Dear God, thank you that you care for us and know what is best for us. Thank you that you love us even when we disobey you. Please help us to do what you ask and not give in to temptation. Thank you for sending Jesus as a sacrifice to sort out our sin. Amen.

Do It

When making choices today, think, "What would God want me to do?"

And don't talk to snakes!



DAY 3

The Flood: World Washed Clean

GENESIS 6 – 9



Our Story

Have you ever played spot the odd one out where one thing is clearly different to the others? Say, a ballet shoe amongst football boots?

Have you ever experienced feeling like the odd one out? Maybe because you didn't make the school team or you don't have the coolest shoes?

Or, maybe because you believe something different to those around you?

God's Story

Today's story is about someone who was the odd one out. It begins a long time after the world was made. God is sad because the world is no longer "very good" or even "good". It's violent and wicked. Everyone is only evil all the time. Imagine that! And this filled God's heart with pain, so much so that God decided to start all over again.

The Flood Story

As God looked to see who to use to be part of his rescue plan there was only one clear option. This man was different. He was the odd one out. He was blameless among the people of his time, and he walked with God. He was not corrupt or wicked or violent. He did everything God asked him to do. So when God told him to build a massive boat, even though he lived nowhere near the sea, he did. Which made him odder still...

"Right then," said Noah, "All done. Now that we've finished the water-proofing, the animals will come."

The neighbours had already arrived. They'd set up their chairs. They were watching, pointing and laughing.

"Building a boat!" one giggled.

"The animals will come!" another smirked.

"Noah says it's going to rain for 40 days and nights!" another roared with laughter, slapping his thigh.

"Everything will be destroyed, he says... ha ha ha."

"What a joke."

"What a foolish, odd, old man!"

Then two by two the animals began to arrive—slithering snakes, galloping giraffes, hopping hares, bounding baboons, climbing koalas, leaping leopards and flapping finches. Two by two they continued to come, until all kinds of creatures were on board.

"Welcome, welcome. In y'all go," Noah shouted. "We'll get you some food. You can soon have a snooze. The floodgates of heaven are about to open."

"In you all go too!" Noah said to his family. "God will close the door. He'll save us and protect us."

And then it began to rain. For 40 days the rain kept coming. Waters gurgled up from the deep and rain lashed down from above. Puddles turned to streams and then to rivers and then to seas. Everything was covered. The world was having a wash.

And then the rain stopped. And for the next eleven months the waters receded. Seas returned to being rivers. Streams became puddles again. And then God told Noah to leave the ark.

"God has saved us and protected us!" Noah shouted joyfully to his family and the animals. "Out you all go!"

And the animals and people poured out—cheering, woofing, braying and chirping with delight. This was a fresh start, and God told Noah's family to go out and enjoy it.

God's Story

This was a second chance for the world but God knew that people would still not trust and obey him. So he strung a beautiful bow across the sky as a promise that there would never be another flood. But this rainbow also pointed to his promise of a person who would bring a rescue plan that would be for all people and last for all time.

Our Story

Noah was so different. What a role model! He walked closely with God when everyone else was ignoring him. He did what God asked even when it seemed totally crazy. He was the odd one out. Be courageous if you feel like the odd one out sometimes and if people laugh at you for your faith in God. God is looking for people like Noah who are different and who will be part of his plan of salvation.

Read It: Genesis 6 v 9-15

This is the account of Noah and his family.

Noah was a righteous man, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked faithfully with God. Noah had three sons: Shem, Ham and Japheth.

Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence. God saw how corrupt the earth had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways. So God said to Noah, "I am going to put an end to all people, for the earth is filled with violence because of them. I am surely going to destroy both them and the earth. So make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in it and coat it with pitch inside and out.

Discuss It

- *If you were stuck on the ark, which animal would you want to share a bedroom with and why?*
- *Why did God flood the earth?*
- *What was different about Noah—why was he the odd one out?*
- *Have you ever felt different or weird because you follow God?*
- *How has Noah's bravery and determination to be different by following God challenged or encouraged you?*

Pray It

Dear God, thank you for saving Noah's family when you washed the world clean. Help us to live as your friends and do what you ask us to do, even if that means being different. Amen.

Do It

Draw a rainbow. Keep it with you. Remember that God keeps his promises and he cares for you.



DAY 4

The Tower: The People Scatter

GENESIS 11:1-9



Our Story

Have you got any top skills or special talents? Maybe you can do a record-breaking number of cartwheels, grow prize-winning carrots or name all the capital cities of the world? What would it be like if everyone knew your name because you had done something amazing or had an incredible talent?

But what if there's something way more important than just trying to make a name for yourself?

God's Story

There is a big jump in time between Noah and the flood and today's story about the tower of Babel. There are now many families living and working together in a place called Shinar, a flat fertile area in modern Iraq. But just like in Noah's day, they have totally forgotten about God. They are thinking only about themselves, their skills and talents and how great they could be... It all looks very impressive and under their control.

The Tower Story

The people had built a big, bold, beautiful city. It was magnificent. It was their pride and joy. However, now they wanted to do more, something that would amaze and excite. This creation would be even bigger, bolder and more beautiful. It would reflect their brilliance and brains. It would get the whole world talking about them...

The people on Shinar plain got together. They talked, discussed, negotiated

and decided. They were so proud of themselves, their plans, tools, technology and talents.

They would construct a tower, a ziggurat, like in the surrounding cities. However, their tower would be taller and stronger; their tower would reach the heavens. Their tower would not only have stairs and a temple on top—it would be a stairway to heaven! Their tower would be famous. *They* would be famous—more famous than God!

Architects articulated the plan.

Engineers talked through the technical challenges.

Craftsmen chatted as they made bricks from mud.

Builders bantered and bellowed instructions.

Manual labourers mumbled.

Babies babbled and children cheered.

Nothing and no one could stop them!

And all this time God was watching with amusement and concern. He was amused that they thought they could actually reach heaven and he was concerned that they wanted to build a world without him. “No, this can’t continue,” he decided. “I’ll have to stop them. They are far too full of themselves, too powerful. Together like this they will do more harm than good. Let’s go down to them and confuse their languages, so they cannot understand each other.”

So God did. He confused their languages. And a cacophony of nonsense filled the air. Nothing made sense. The people could no longer talk, discuss, negotiate and decide together. The building work ground to a halt.

And with no language to unite them, they separated and spread out over the world. Far from making a great name for themselves, these proud people, in their confusion, could only babble.

God’s Story

The people in Shinar had totally forgotten about their great God. They were thinking only about themselves and how great they could be. God needed to remind them that he is the greatest and that they would be far more fulfilled by knowing him and being part of his story, rather than ignoring him and trying to write their own. So rather than becoming famous for their building project, they became infamous for ignoring God.

Our Story

God has given all of us special skills and talents. But we need to be careful, because when we are good at something or successful in something it can make us feel important, safe and secure. We can begin to ignore God. It's always best to make sure people hear about how great God is, not how amazing we are.

Read It: Genesis 11 v 1, 4-9

Now the whole world had one language and a common speech ...

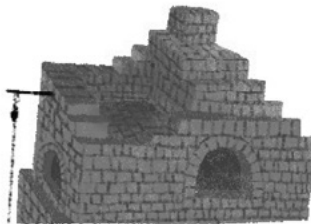
Then they said, "Come, let us build ourselves a city, with a tower that reaches to the heavens, so that we may make a name for ourselves; otherwise we will be scattered over the face of the whole earth."

But the LORD came down to see the city and the tower the people were building. The LORD said, "If as one people speaking the same language they have begun to do this, then nothing they plan to do will be impossible for them. Come, let us go down and confuse their language so they will not understand each other."

So the LORD scattered them from there over all the earth, and they stopped building the city. That is why it was called Babel—because there the LORD confused the language of the whole world. From there the LORD scattered them over the face of the whole earth.

Discuss It

- Why did the people try to build a big city and great tower?
- In what ways do people show off and try to become famous today?
- Be honest—how are you tempted to show off and try to make a name for yourself?
- How can we make sure we are a team with God in what we say, do and think today?



Pray It

Dear God, help us to always remember your greatness. Help us not to become proud, or too successful, so that we forget about you. In everything we do, help us to make your name great. Amen.

Do It

Find out how to say “Hello” and “Thank you” in another language that you don’t already know.
